

Three dazzling Russian works highlight the brilliance of one of the world's great orchestras as they make their Festival debut in the splendid setting of the new Marlowe. The evening begins theatrically with Glazunov's ballet suite, before our prodigiously talented young violinist tackles Tchaikovsky's most lyrical and virtuosic concerto. Mussorgsky's piano score for *Pictures* has been orchestrated by many, but Ravel's version surpasses all others. His dazzling orchestral palette adds colour to the original, making this musical picture gallery come to life.

The inspired partnership of Norwegian saxophonist Jan Garbarek and Britain's premier vocal group The Hilliard Ensemble has produced consistently inventive music-making since 1993. *Officium Novum*, their long-awaited third album together, draws its musical influences from Armenia, Greece and Estonia. Garbarek's saxophone acts as a free-ranging fifth voice and, while the programme is drawn from the *Officium Novum* disc, the order will not be decided until the sixth voice – that of the Cathedral itself – has spoken.

Canterbury Choral Society returns with ravishing Russian music to conclude this year's Festival. Rachmaninov considered *The Bells* to be one of his finest scores: four movements set (in Russian) to the poetry of Edgar Allan Poe, depicting in turn Silver, Wedding, Alarm and Funeral Bells - all presented in vivid and dramatic colours with the composer's characteristic opulence of sound. Prokofiev's *Cantata Alexander Nevsky*, written as a film score for Eisenstein's film of the same name, depicts the heroic and ultimately triumphant struggle between the Swedes and the Russians, including the famous scene of the *Battle on the Ice*. This work has established itself as one of the greatest 20th century choral and orchestral masterpieces, epic and intense in its power, and leaving a lasting impression on all who hear it.

The concert will begin with Borodin's orchestral 'musical tableau' *On the Steppes in Central Asia.* Evocatively depicting a Caravan of Asian people crossing the desert under the protection of Russian troops, it remains a popular favourite.

However, his passion is matched only by his ineptitude and - from trapping aggrieved bees inside his own suit to accidentally killing off a queen – he's made some major apicultural faux pas. He has now written a memoir and a paean to the British bee, making a jar of honey seem like a miracle once you've heard his story!

David Loyn, the BBC World Affairs Correspondent, has more cause than most to pay homage to the photographers and cameramen who have helped him report stories from all over the world. Some of them have even lost their lives in so doing. 



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


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
