Dodeka is Neame's newly formed 12-piece band which will perform the music he composed and produced during the pandemic. None of the musicians were in the same room at the time, due to lockdown restrictions, but thanks to the wonders of music technology and the internet, the resulting big band album *Glimpses of Truth* was very well received when it finally was performed to a sold-out Ronnie Scott's audience during the 2022 London Jazz Festival.

The core of the band is Neame's quartet - George Crowley (tenor sax), Tom Farmer (bass) and James Maddren (drums) with whom he has played extensively since 2017. Rising and established stars join the line-up including Laura Jurd and Emma Rawicz, in addition to stalwarts of the UK music scene such as Noel Langley and Michael Chillingworth. As close to a Jazz supergroup as you can get.

A slapstick is a device used to create sound and comedy simultaneously. Making good on their title's promise, Släpstick never miss a beat in their multi-skilled, multi-instrumental homage to classical greats, delivering a tour-de-force musical extravaganza of physical comedy.

The Dutch band of five have been bringing houses down all over Europe with their seemingly highbrow classical concert which rapidly glissandos into a series of comical mishaps. It's Chaplin meets Tchaikovsky, Buster versus Bernstein, and Groucho Marx does Mozart, all rolled up into one raucous Schërzo that deftly mocks the 'pomp' in Pomp and Circumstance.

Don't call it a come Bach - Schërzo is terrific fun.

The question is, 'How did these clowns become such accomplished musicians?' Or 'How did these musicians become such accomplished clowns?'

David Reekie The Mysterious Death of Christopher Marlowe

Who killed Christopher Marlowe and why? The life of Canterbury's most famous son and brilliant bad boy, came to a violent end on May 30th, 1593, in a house in Deptford. He was just 29 and at the height of his literary powers, which rivalled those of Shakespeare. Tim Marshall The Future of Geography: How Power and Politics in Space will change our World

Peter Barber Pride and Prejudice in Andrews and Dury's Topographical Maps of Kent & Canterbury (1768-9)

Andrews and Dury's 25-sheet map of Kent (1769) was the first detailed map of the County ever published and its scale was unsurpassed for over a century. Its rococo-style engraving also made it, arguably, the most beautiful. It was accompanied by a plan of Canterbury. The image they conveyed aimed at appealing to the wealthy, landowning elite of the county. The maps tell us as much about the society and social conventions as about the topography of mid-18th century Canterbury and its environs, including the world of some of Jane Austen's closest relatives. Peter Barber, a former head of Maps at The British Library, expands on the place of the map in the history of the mapping of Kent.



Oliver Soden Masquerade: The Lives of Noël Coward

The voice, the dressing-gown, the cigarette in its holder, remain unmistakable.

Noël Coward wrote some fifty plays and nine musicals, as well as revues, screenplays, short stories, poetry, and a novel. He was both composer and lyricist for approximately 675 songs. He was at one point the most highly paid author in the world. Yet some of his most striking and daring writing remains unfamiliar. As T.S. Eliot said, in 1954; 'There are things you can learn from Noël Coward that you won't learn from Shakespeare.'

Geoffrey Munn, Antiques Roadshow presenter and jewellery expert, came from a traditional rural background in Sussex - but only weeks after leaving a country grammar school in 1972, he was plunged into the vortex of the London art world. It was the beginning of the career of a lifetime at the famous firm of Wartski, whose showrooms scintillated with gem-set necklaces, tiaras and three of the famous Fabergé Imperial Easter Eggs.

Geoffrey relates his daunting but delightful encounters with royalty – and showbiz royalty – throughout his career and reflects on how dramatically society has moved on for those who sell, buy, and wear such treasures.



William Sieghart The Poetry Pharmacy Forever




